TASK 3: Phonological Treatment of Loanwords (14 pts)

Each of the following Japanese words is a loanword from English, and each has been modified to make it conform to the phonological structure of Japanese, for example *waffru*: 'waffle'; *miruku* 'milk'; *appuru pai* 'apple pie';

Your task is to identify the English word which has been borrowed in each case. Yet, before you do, read some of the definitions and examples below. They aim to help you do this task!

- Loanword a word taken from one language and used in another, e.g., Pol. *mecz* was borrowed from Engl. *match* or Pol. *burmistrz* from Germ. *Bürgermeister*. Note that in loanwords, the spelling and pronunciation are usually adapted to phonological and spelling system of the borrowing language, see *mecz>match*.
- **Phonetic symbols**; In the transcription of the words below the following symbols are used:
 - $\langle j \rangle$ for $\langle d_3 \rangle$, as in judge $\langle d_3 \wedge d_3 \rangle$, age $\langle e_1 d_3 \rangle$
 - $\langle y \rangle$ for /j/, as in yet /jet/, use /ju:z/
 - <sh> for /3/, as in *pleasure* /'ple3.ər/, *vision* /'vi3.ən/
 - <ch> for /tʃ/, as in church /tʃ3:tʃ/, match /mætʃ/

other symbols have their usual phonetic values in the International Phonetic Alphabeth. However, in some examples <r> stands for /l/. Note also that**Japanese**<math>u and **final** o are rather weakly pronounced.
